THE PRAYER STATION

For several years, clergy and healing prayer ministers have offered intercessory prayer in a corner of the Sanctuary during the Eucharist, to the side of the altar. Now this space has become more clearly defined as a special area for prayer with new liturgical furnishings. The new I AM corner table, wall banners and floor covering complement the existing Prie Dieu, candle and candle holder to create a space dedicated to intercessory prayer.

The prayer station is designed to convey a message of hope, following in the Saint Barnabas tradition of unique, custom designed artistic works featuring images that express the metanarrative of the Christian story.

The I AM table was designed and built by Tom Baker and given to the glory of God in memory of Judy Echols. The candle holder was made by Tom Baker and given to the glory of God in memory of his mother, Elsie Baker.

The banners were made possible by two donations: one from Jennifer Steege in loving memory of her parents, Elizabeth and Howard Smith; the other was from the Dunlap memorial fund, given in loving memory of Charles and Nancy Dunlap by Ann Goodman, Charlie Dunlap and Bunny Hall.

The Prie Dieu rests on a blue floor covering made especially for the prayer station, given by Peggy Iacobelli in thanksgiving for the members of the Memorial Acceptance and Fine Arts Committee who worked so tirelessly to complete the Prayer Station. HEALING PRAYER DEDICATION

On May 1 at the 10:15 service Saint Barnabas will be consecrating the new Healing Prayer Station.

Orientation is being offered for new and returning Healing Prayer Ministers.

During Holy Communion at both Sunday morning services and immediately after the 10:15 service, Healing Prayer Ministers join clergy in anointing and praying for those who request healing prayers. Healing Prayer Ministers serve monthly or more often as preferred.

An orientation for new and returning Healing Prayer Ministers is scheduled for May 15 after the 7:45 and 10:15 a.m. services in the Sanctuary. The orientation will prepare Ministers for Sunday morning service through an exploration of the language and gestures of prayer that provide comfort and encouragement to

TRAINING TO BE A COMMUNITY OF HOPE LAY CHAPLAIN

Do you feel God calling you into a new ministry to be the hands, feet, and listening ears for a broken world? Are you ready for a new commitment to your faith and in service to others?

A 12-week training for Community of Hope lay chaplains begins in October 2022, and we are currently welcoming applications.

Community of Hope (COH) is a pastoral care model that equips and deploys lay chaplains to meet the community's varied pastoral needs, including loss, grief, illness, aging, life transition, loneliness, to name but a few. The COH model is based on Benedictine Spirituality, intended to build a community of caregivers united in prayer and worship. If you've been looking for a way to serve at Saint Barnabas, maybe Community of Hope is for you.

Applications will be reviewed in early September, and those accepted into the program will be notified at the end of September.

Welcoming the Neighborhood







Join the Conversation
